- D + **N_P** *Label* all containers carefully. • Entering the world of the taxonomist, photographer Kate Salway has pictured the obsessions of those who collect and *label* nature's curiosities.
- T1 + **N_P + N/N_P + DESCRIPTION** It was not just that Richard Nixon's domestic critics were ready to *label* him a madman but that, in his desire to end the war in a satisfying fashion, he was ready to *label* himself one. • It will now be more difficult for the Tories to *label* Labour the tax-raising party.
- T2 + **N_P + ADJ** They would drag her into court, perhaps *label* her insane.
- T3 + **N_P + as N/N_P + as DESCRIPTION** As a former army general Groener was quick to *label* himself as no fleet enthusiast. • When we *label* experiences as "being cold" or "being tired," the remedies seem naturally also to fall into appropriate categories and do not need to be rediscovered for each instance.
- T4 + **N_P + as ADJ** I think that there were theoretical reasons for a reluctance to *label* a child as depressed.
- T5 + **N_P + with N** To prevent your own later confusion, *label* all photocopies immediately with the author's name at the top.

Label means 'put a label on something' and is often used to mean 'call someone or something something'.

- P1 She pointed out that to have written what he did was a sign of organisation, not its *lack*. (only if clear from context)
- P2 + **of N** There is a serious *lack* of information about tobacco products and this only proves again that the tobacco industry will not give consumers information. • He decries the *lack* of good students going into science these days, and attributes it to society's disillusionment with science.

If there is a **lack of something** there is either none or not enough of it.
