# **Scope**

- Chinese as a Second Language Research (CASLAR) focuses on research on the acquisition, development, and use of Chinese as a Second Language. It supports scholars and researchers from different linguistic fields, and serves as a forum to discuss, investigate, and better understand Chinese as a Second Language. Each issue of the journal publishes three papers in Chinese and three papers in English; summaries are always provided both in Chinese and English.

# Submissions in the following fields are welcome

We are especially interested in publishing articles and research papers that

- investigate how empirical findings of CSL research can advance and develop better Chinese language teaching methodologies,
- explore the implications of CSL research for theoretical developments and practical applications
- focus on the acquisition and use of varieties of CSL
- study the nature of interaction between native speakers and non-native speakers of Chinese
- address major issues of second language acquisition from the perspective of CSL
- analyze the ways in which language is both shaped by culture and is the medium through which culture is created

# Peer review, turnaround times and preprint policies

### Peer review information

*CASLAR* is a single-blind journal. Manuscripts are reviewed anonymously by at least two independent reviewers selected by the Editors. You will be informed by e-mail if your manuscript has been accepted or rejected or if it requires further attention. Reviewers' comments will be available to the authors. Every effort is made to respond to the authors in a timely manner.

The editors reserve the right to reject submitted manuscripts without peer review if the studies are not novel or important enough to merit publication in the journal. Manuscripts deemed unsuitable (insufficient originality or limited interest to the target audience) will be also rejected without review.

### Turnaround time

*CASLAR* aspires to inform authors of the peer review decision within 8–12 weeks from submission date. Revised manuscripts should be returned within 3–6 weeks. Accepted articles will be published online within 8 weeks after issue-wise manuscript transfer to production.

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Manuscripts that do not meet the quality requirements of the journal (novelty, structure, language, well-defined methodology) or manuscripts that do not fit into the scope of the journal, are likely to be rejected without peer review.

Manuscripts are also returned to authors if they do not comply with the Instructions for Authors.

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Manuscripts that have been rejected for publication will be reconsidered only at the discretion of the Editor(s). Authors wishing to request reconsideration of a previously rejected manuscript must do so in written form and submit a rebuttal by e-mail to the journal's editorial office. Authors should provide detailed reasons why they believe the manuscript should be reconsidered. If the rebuttal is accepted, the author will be asked to re-submit the manuscript, or the decision will be reversed.

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# Preparation of manuscript

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(to be considered no later than after acceptance with revision)

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Keep the use of italic and bold font type, underlining and background color in tables to a minimum and make only use of it when absolutely necessary to draw attention to a particular linguistic feature that cannot be highlighted otherwise.
