


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Scope and general policies of the journal

Scope

International Public History, the official organ of the International Federation for Public History, is an English-language, hybrid journal published twice a year, in June and December.

IPH features a mix of theoretical, empirical, research based and practice-oriented scholarly articles, conversations, interviews, and reviews, enhanced by images, film and audio clips. Topics range from description and analysis of public history projects to debating theories, methods, approaches and issues undertaking public history and engaging different publics. Readers will encounter discussions about the public and political uses of history, oral history, public archaeology, heritage, digital public history, history and memory, exhibiting and curating, collecting and preservation, access and open access, sharing and shared authority, teaching public history, performance, and many more subjects, frequently brought into sharp focus through special thematic sections. It also includes reviews of publications in English and all other languages, of new museums and exhibitions, films, websites, apps and performances from around the world. We encourage comparative perspectives and global co-authorship.

Targeted audience: public historians and students in universities, colleges, and schools, people working in museums and memorial/heritage sites, in foundations, archives, history agencies and historical research firms, in radio, television, film and other media, as tour guides, and in many other fields.

Peer review, turnaround times and preprint policies

Peer review information

IPH is a double anonymous peer-reviewed journal. Manuscripts are reviewed anonymously by at least two independent reviewers selected by the Editors.

Turnaround time

IPH aspires to inform authors of the peer review decision within 1-2 months from submission date. Return times for revised manuscripts will be negotiated with each author.

Issue-based publication

Articles are first published online as DOI citable articles and are later assigned to an issue with final page numbers.

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Manuscripts will be rejected based on negative peer review.

In addition, the editors reserve the right to reject submitted manuscripts without peer review if the studies are not novel or important enough to merit publication in the journal. Manuscripts deemed unsuitable (insufficient originality or limited interest to the target audience) will be also rejected without review.

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Inclusive language recognizes diversity, conveys respect for all people, is sensitive to differences and promotes equal opportunities.

We strongly suggest authors use gender-neutral language.

Content should not make assumptions about readers' beliefs or commitments; should not contain anything that might suggest that one person is superior to another because of age, gender, race, ethnicity, culture, sexual orientation, disability or health condition; and should use inclusive language throughout. Authors should ensure that their writing is free from prejudice, stereotypes, slang, references to the dominant culture and/or cultural assumptions.

We advise the following approach: Aim for gender neutrality by using plural nouns (clinicians, clients, participants) as standard and avoiding "he" or "she", wherever possible. Instead, please use "they". We recommend avoiding the use of descriptors that refer to personal characteristics such as age, gender, race, ethnicity, culture, sexual orientation, disability or health status unless they are relevant and valid.

Submission of manuscripts

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Previously published material must be referenced appropriately in the manuscript, regardless of whether the material was previously published in a subscription based, hybrid or open access journal, or in another language.

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All instructions for proof corrections, including deadlines, will be given in the e-mail notification to the corresponding author, along with a user guide, providing step-by-step instructions for inserting corrections.

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Acknowledgments

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Individuals who helped or participated in certain substantive aspects of the project or work (e.g., technical services staff), but whose contributions were not of sufficient extent to be listed as co-authors, should be appropriately acknowledged, usually in an Acknowledgements section.
